## **BREAD FOR THE WORLD** *Offering of Letters*

TUCO will participate in our yearly Bread for the World (BFW) letter writing campaign. BFW has been a national Christian lobbying organization for 35 years. The needs of **hungry** people are more critical now, because of the global financial crisis. The price of soybeans and corn has risen; the price of rice has tripled. Nearly one billion people are hungry and do not have clean water! Hundreds of thousands of women and children are dying.



In the USA government, 25 agencies control the foreign aid money and programs. There is a growing need to streamline and coordinate providing food, education for subsistence farmers on better methods, and education for children.

Education on earthworm culture and providing “seed worms” is being done in Nicaragua, to improve food and coffee yields. USA foreign aid money and workers cooperate with Church World Service, and local agencies that know the needs. In Africa, our money provides HIV medication. Once under treatment, people are well enough to work again and take care of their families.

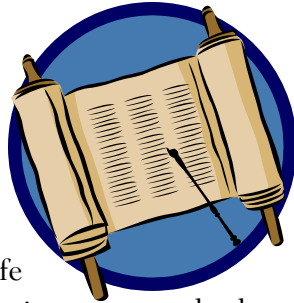

## DEAD SEA SCROLLS CLASS

Since their discovery in 1948 by a little boy throwing rocks in the hills along the Dead Sea in Israel, The Dead Sea Scrolls have tremendously informed biblical scholarship.

Continuing through June 7, **Dr. Ian Werrett**, Assistant Professor of Religious Studies, and Director of The Spiritual Life Institute at Saint Martin's University leads a six-session course introducing modern students to the ancient scrolls of the Dead Sea. (No class on May 31—single Family Style Worship, 10 a.m.)

This course is also exploring the circumstances of their discovery, interesting archaeological factors, what we know about authorship and language used, and the scrolls' contents. Special attention will be placed on the relationship between the Dead Sea Scrolls and our English Bible. All are invited.

On May 17 the donation of \$1 per member will be collected, to continue our many years of being a covenant church with BFW. Last year we collected \$280, but we have 400 members. Any \$1 bill in the collection plate will be sent to BFW. Additional donations or memberships can be made by check. Twenty-seven letters to Congress were mailed by the office. We can do better than that.

We will lobby Congress by writing to our Senators and Representative, on the current issue of streamlining our Foreign Aid Programs. A suggested sample letter will be provided and is on [www.Bread.org](http://www.Bread.org). It is up to you how you communicate with your Congress persons. Research shows that handwritten letters are the most effective. If it is more convenient for you to send emails, that will work. Rep. Adam Smith is a leader in Foreign Aid Reform! By May 17<sup>th</sup> there will probably be a specific bill to support. The Capitol Switchboard # is 1-202-224-3121.

MPJ members will have Congressional phone numbers, addresses and writing materials at a table in the Narthex on May 17<sup>th</sup>. A bulletin insert with sample letter will be provided to everyone. A Minute for Mission will be presented on the most recent developments in Congress. We can help Congress do “the right thing.” Let us join with many faith communities in the WAR against apathy, injustice and poverty. Thank you!

period might cover the interval December through February of next year. Alternatively, if it is possible to arrange for housing of the camp during that period in the more protected area of First Christian Church, our turn might be deferred to the early spring or early summer of 2010. This possibility will depend upon the ability and consent of First Christian and the City of Olympia (under the ordinance) to accommodate the camp at First Christian during the December-February period.

***The Need and Involvement of Other Churches.*** When TUCO agreed to host Camp Quixote in 2007, we were but one of two churches willing at that time to make such a commitment. Today, thanks, in part, to our example, we now have seven congregations who, as of this summer, will have made their property available to the camp – some, like us, more than once. In addition, continuing enlistment efforts have been directed at other churches in Tumwater and Lacey (with the ordinance impediment in that city now removed) for their similar involvement. Their participation will offer them the opportunity we have experienced – a first-hand insight into the plight of the disadvantaged. Of equal importance for us, their commitment, like those of our other faith communities already involved, will insure that an inequitable burden will not fall on our church in this ministry.

***The Question of Hosting Costs.*** Notwithstanding the impact of the current economic situation on our church budget, there are sufficient resources to meet the expenses that can be reasonably projected, based in part on our prior hosting experiences. Our local benevolence budget allocates funds to cover a significant portion of these anticipated costs. Again, the experience at our church and others has demonstrated the existence of other funding resources to meet these costs.

***Contacting the Council with Your Comments.*** The question before us, council and congregation alike, seeks to determine whether we wish to address the current issues of homelessness in terms of that form of direct involvement with Camp Quixote which serving as a host church entails. **Our Council urges you to share your thoughts with us, by answering the brief questionnaire to be found either on our website (link to it on the homepage: [www.theunitedchurches.org](http://www.theunitedchurches.org)) or in hard copy in the Narthex (returning the same to the office). Please do so no later than June 4.** If you seek additional information about the camp and any related matters, please speak with either Pastor Mark or Lee Johnson (866-2972).

## LINKS IN THE PRAYER CHAIN

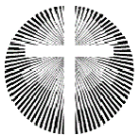
